# HOW CAN WE IMPLEMENT INNOVATIVE FOOD SYSTEMS THAT POSITIVELY IMPACT THE ENVIRONMENT, WHILST ALSO BENEFITING LOCAL COMMUNITIES?

Earlier this year, the GLFx Cape Town speaker stage at Greenpop's Reforest Fest posed this question to a series of speakers, inviting them to discuss the topic of landscapes and food systems in a series of talks. GLFx Cape Town will present extracts from this series, discussing the complex dynamics of food and equity, and the potential to shape the future of food systems in South Africa. Excerpts come from:

- Mercy Nqandeka of Viva con Agua, who discusses the importance of equity in restoring rural landscapes and communities in South Africa;
- Kaspar Paur from the Oceaneers, who addresses the importance of food choices on ocean health;
- Tasneem Karodia, who tells us more about cultivated meat and the role of Mzansi Meat in developing ways to consume sustainably in the future;

- Gray Maguire from the Climate Neutral Group, who shares information about their role in promoting regenerative farming in Southern Africa; and
- Rosanna 'Rosie' McLean whose original poetry is called 'You can find me in nature'.

While initiatives like the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration and the Global Landscapes Forum continue to spearhead global awareness, the onus also remains on individuals, companies and national governments to ensure our actions, perspectives and projects are operating within the context and relevance of our local environments. This session aims to present and summarize a diversity of perspectives on food systems in South Africa, highlighting particular complexities with equity, livelihoods and accessibility. Excerpts showcase local activists, organisations and movements working towards food sustainability, and demonstrate innovative technologies, tools and networks for transforming food systems towards equity. As there can be no environmental justice without social justice, we discuss how systemically shifting away from unsustainable models and providing an inclusive and appealing alternative that benefits broadly is far better than calls to flatten unsustainable food system industries entirely.

### **KEY POINTS**

- It is key to remember that food systems and sustainability are not black and white
- Food system equity and innovation can be supported and promoted through initiatives, movements and activists like Viva con Agua, Oceaneers, Mzansi Meat and the Climate Neutral Group
- It is important to stay sceptical of false dichotomies that fail to account for local circumstances or needs, or that 'demonise' or place blame on local communities, small-scale producers or consumers, rather than large, industrial food systems.
- We need to implement innovative and holistic solutions to address barriers to food system sustainability, including financing, behavioural change and awareness raising.
